Hymn Festival 2018

St. Andrew's will be the setting for this year's Three Choirs Hymn Festival for Ascension on Thursday, May 10, at 7:00 p.m. This will be the third year for what has turned out to be a successful musical occasion and collaboration between the St. Andrew's Parish Choir and the choirs of Christ & St. Luke's and St Paul's churches, with their respective choirmasters, Kevin Kwan and Chuck Woodward. We are pleased to have as this year's

guest conductor, Walden Moore, Director of Music at Trinity Church on the Green in New Haven, Conn. In addition to hymns appropriate to the Easter season and Ascension, special choir music will include *Ascendit Dens* by the late Tudor composer Peter Philips, a setting of *King of Glory, King of Peace* by the contemporary American composer Andrew Clarkson using the tune *General Seminary* found in our hymnal, and a grand anthem by 20th century American composer Leo Sowerby, *Be ye followers of God.*

Walden Moore has been the Director of Music at Trinity since 1984, where he conducts a choir of Men and Boys, Men and Girls, and the Parish Choir, which is an adult mixed choir. These choirs are renowned for their music in support of services and special programs undertaken each year. He is a 1980 graduate of the Institute of Sacred Music at Yale University, where he studied with Robert Baker and Gerre Hancock.

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A Summer of Peace ... For our children, youth, and adults

Did you know the word peace appears in the NRSV Bible over 337 times? Knowing this, peace is an important mission that we are challenged to pursue as Christians throughout our entire life.

In Jesus' *Sermon on the Mount,* he begins with the Beatitudes where he shares "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." We discover this entire sermon in Matthew's gospel, chapters 5–7. Jesus' sermon covers

Walden is frequently in demand as a guest conductor and organist at choir festivals across the nation. He has been the guest Music Director for Royal School of Church Music in America courses at King's College in Wilkes-Barre PA and Charlotte NC. He was also a guest lecturer for the Diocese of Virginia Leadership Program for Musicians workshop in Richmond in 2014. Since 2007, he has been on the faculty of the Yale University Institute of Sacred Music.

In other music news, the last Sunday for our Parish Choir will be Pentecost Sunday on May 20. Beginning the following week, our annual summer choir begins. All that is required for summer choir is to show up at 9:45 a.m. on Sunday morning to run through the hymns of the day. Summer choir will run through to Labor Day weekend. If you are thinking of choir but are not sure, or like to sing but don't have time during the regular season, this is a good opportunity. In June, I will be travelling to San Antonio, Texas, to attend the annual conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians. This will be a particularly important event for me this year, as I will be starting a 3-year term as editor of the *The Journal of the Association of Anglican Musicians*. This has been a primary resource for my professional development, and I was honored to be elected to membership in 2010.

many themes that grow out of this initial focus on peacemaking. He discusses how to be in relationship with others, the challenge of loving your enemies, the importance of giving to the needy, how to pray, how to fast, how to withhold judgment, and more. One

could argue that living as a peacemaker is a central thread that ties together the whole framework of his sermon.

This summer our children and youth will be focusing on many of the themes in Sermon on the Mount as they learn about peace and discover how to be peacemakers. In June, our $10^{th} - 12^{th}$ grade youth will travel to Northern Ireland on a Peace Pilgrimage where they will learn about the region's history of conflict and how various communities there have worked for peace. This experience will give our pilgrims a chance to deepen their relationship with God and with each other while reflecting on the value and importance of peacemaking. They will gain skills and perspectives that aid in seeking peace in our own context and communities.

In July, our younger parish children will participate in a "Peace Lab" experience at Vacation Bible School. Based on a curriculum developed by the Mennonite community, the Peace Lab helps children explore in fun and meaningful ways the role of peacemakers in finding good ways to solve problems, help other people, speak up for what is right, and asking for help to resolve conflicts.

We are currently discerning ways in which our Summer of Peace will extend to adult learning and formation as well. There is a possibility that we will be asked to be a pilot site in a national church initiative to help congregations learn about the roots and realities of conflict in the Holy Land, and how Episcopal churches can be engaged in the work of peace in that region. If that does not come to fruition, we will explore a book study or a field trip or another means of learning. Stay tuned!

In the meantime, we encourage you to reread Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. Reflect on what Jesus' words mean to you in this period of your life. This will be an exciting time for our parish as members of all ages journey together in this Summer of Peace. We will have the opportunity to deepen our relationship with God, with each other, and our understanding of God's call to live as peacemakers in our local community and world. Join us!

Vestry Updates

- At the March Vestry meeting, the Vestry discussed several new communications strategies for the parish. These included the possibility of making audio recordings of the sermons, to be posted on the website and on social media; better publicity and usage of the church's social media platforms; occasional printing of the full service in the bulletin on special feast days; increased giving opportunities through the website and text-based services, and more.
- At the April meeting, we heard an update on safety and hospitality
 projects. Donations have been received for the installation of two
 AEDs (defibrillators), and they will soon be ordered and installed in the
 narthex and in White Hall. Vestry and staff members will be trained on
 their proper usage. We also continue to raise money and wait for cost
 estimates for the proposed project shortening several pews in the
 church to allow for improved hospitality and accessibility for those in
 wheelchairs.
- Also at the April meeting, we reviewed the results of the January/February parish survey regarding the church's mission statement and core values. There were 24 respondents, which is a relatively small number, but there was nonetheless some helpful and interesting feedback. We will share with the parish at the Annual Meeting in May.

St. Andrew's Red Cross Blood Drive

on May 9th from 1:00 - 7:00 p.m. Sometimes we all need to be reminded of the statistics: more than 41,000 blood donations are needed every day in the U.S.. This comes out to just under 15 million units that are needed annual-

ly. How many blood donors are

there? About 9.2 million. Although 38% of us are eligible to donate blood, only about 10% of us actually do and many give no more than once per year. We also need to keep in mind that as brilliant as scientists can be, they have been unable to duplicate an artificial blood that works like the

original substance. So, with a little twist on the Golden Rule, Give unto others as you would have them give unto you. Be a life-saver (literally), donate blood. Sign-up sheets for both donors and volunteers are outside of White Hall. Our goal is to schedule 70 donors.

Education for Ministry (EfM)



What is EfM? Although it sounds like it, those who take this course are not training to be ordained ministers or deacons. Rather, through reading, discussion, and reflection, they are determining what their personal ministry will be in this world. The Episcopal Church believes that every baptized person is called to ministry. EfM is designed to help you explore what that ministry might be. The 4 year course curriculum covers the Bible, church history, and theology. This is not a Bible study course, however. Nor are

students expected to give reports on reading content. Using a oneroom school approach, students from all four years gather and discuss how the readings impacted and challenged them. The students look to see how the readings from each year might be linked, how Biblical content and history are reflected in our lives. Each year we have a resource and guide book that has a theme that is carried throughout the year. For example, one year's theme was living faithfully in a multicultural world while another theme was how to live spiritually as a mature Christian. During the year the students share their spiritual journeys. Each student is encouraged, through the process of theological reflection, to look at what they are learning, how the material is related to our culture and what is happening in the world today, as well as how the content impacts their personal ministry, theology and beliefs.

The EfM program is presented in a seminar format to 6-10 participants led by mentors Carolyn Moneymaker and Deane Sobol. Beginning in September and ending in late May, the group meets each Tuesday from 6:30 pm to 9:00 pm. The course is \$375 per year (scholarships are available). Students do not commit to the entire four years. If you are interested in attending, additional information may be found at http://efm.sewanee.edu/.
