EVENSONG HERE AND ABROAD

horal Evensong is a service unique to our Anglican communion and occupies a special place in our Anglican heritage. Choral Evensong is sung Evening Prayer, the office which closes the day. I have had the opportunity to sing Evensong in a number of places over the course of my musical life, and the service holds a deeply personal attachment for me with its many memories.

My most recent experience was being able to participate in the RSCM (Royal School of Church Music) America Choir,

singing services this past December 28 through January 2 at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin, Ireland. Although St. Andrew's is affiliated with RSCM, I had not followed this activity until a former choir director of mine, Bruce Neswick, was engaged as the guest conductor for the Dublin trip. He contacted me last May to invite my interest, and my wife Joanna and I decided to make the trip.

Singing in cathedrals is fun! The clergy and people of St. Patrick's Cathedral, which is the national cathedral for the Anglican Church of Ireland, were very hospitable, and it was a fascinating place to be.

We sang Evensong for 5 days, in addition to a sung Eucharist on Sunday morning. It was also rewarding to be part of a choir of people from all over the United States and Canada—I even reconnected with some friends I had not seen in many years. We sang great music and experienced great worship. We also had plenty of time on our own to enjoy Dublin, including neighborhood pubs with live traditional Irish music.

One of my hopes for St. Andrew's is to increase the number of offerings of Evensong each year, beyond the one we traditionally do as part of the All Saints' weekend. The next opportunity will be **Sunday, March 10** at 5 p.m. The music will include a recent setting of the Magnificat & Nunc dimittis, the Evening Prayer canticles, by contemporary composer Alfred Fedak and originally written for the cathedral in Portland, Maine. It is restrained, yet mildly festive, which makes it a good Lenten offering. We will be singing another Evensong service in the Easter season on **May 19**.



Why are we doing this and increasing our offerings? We are going to England! In August 2020, the St. Andrew's Choir will be traveling to England to be the choir in residence at the cathedral in Lichfield. Lichfield is located in the northern Midlands, and the cathedral is famous as the burial place of St. Chad, who founded the cathedral and diocese in the 7th century. From August 10-16, 2020, our choir will be singing Evensong daily, with one day off, and Choral Eucharist on Sunday morning in addition to the evening service. For a week, we will become the part of the life of the cathedral in its mission to the community. Of course, we will be having other kinds of fun as well, with daily side trips to places of historical and cultural interest.

In order to be ready, we need to be doing the service and music more frequently, as well as an occasional sung Eucharist. A planning committee has been established, and we will be announcing fundraising events to help us offset some of the group expenses. This is a unique opportunity for us, so please help support our effort and we look forward to seeing you at Choral Evensong.

The big truck pulled in and delivered huge bags of nutritious vegetables and grains, and volunteers (from pre-schoolers to the "I'll work sitting down, thank you" crowd) got to work.

Rise Against Hunger feeds about 1.7 million people a year in parts of the world where people often go to bed hungry. Small-scale indigenous farmers provide the locally-sourced, sustainably-grown vegetables, thereby supporting their own families. Then workers from places like

St. Andrew's (almost a half million volunteers a year) fill and seal over





10,000 packets – all in a stunningly well-planned and organized project. The funny hats are one of the ways the food is kept fresh and clean to be shipped to where it's needed most, and the fast pace and the noise in the room are all part of the fun.


Presented by the Women of St. Andrew's, the theme of this year's retreat is *The Stories* of the Bible are the Stories of our Lives. Exile, wilderness, desert. We've all been there. We've all experienced moving out of bondage into freedom, out of error into truth, out of death into life. We've faced temptation. We've had angels tend to us. As we hear the stories of the Bible, we recognize that they are the same stories we are living today, even though the details have changed over the millennia. Jesus often taught by telling stories. We learn the arc of salvation history through the stories told in scripture. As to our own lives, we connect with others by sharing stories.



In this Lenten retreat, the Rev. Lauren McDonald (Bruton Parish Church) will lead us in examining some of the themes of biblical stories and how they play out in our own lives. VESTY UPDATES

In January, the Vestry gathered for an annual retreat, during which we did some strategic thinking around areas of anxiety and inertia, and also areas of energy and excitement, in our parish life. The staff undertook a similar brainstorming exercise in early February, and this collective guidance will be formed into several action steps in the coming months. Stay tuned.

Also in January, we initiated a process to update the bathrooms in the ambulatory hallway (one by the choir room and one by the clergy vesting room). We also purchased a used Cleveland steam kettle for the kitchen; it will be installed in late February or early March.

We also enjoyed an Adult Forum presentation by Jim Rhodes on the history of St. Andrew's, corresponding with an invitation by the Planned Giving Committee to consider how we can support the future of our beloved church.
